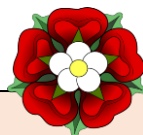

Key Knowledge - Tudors

The Tudor period was the period between 1485 and 1603. It is called the 'Tudor' period as 'Tudor' was the surname of the monarchs during this time.

Britain in the Tudor period was diverse, with people who had different ethnicities and beliefs. During the Tudor period black people migrated to Britain for work. They were treated the same as other people as during this time religious beliefs were seen as a bigger difference than the colour of your skin.

There were lots of changes in the Tudor period. King Henry VIII wanted a divorce so he created his own Church called 'The Church of England.' A new religion was introduced to Britain - Protestantism. This is called the 'Reformation.' Before, Britain had been Catholic. Even today in some parts of Britain, people are still fighting over which religion is the best.

Key Vocabulary

Migration - movement of people.

Catholic - a type of Christian where the Pope is the head of the Church and people spoke Latin.

Protestant - a type of Christian where the services and Bibles are in English and the pope is not the head.

Church of England - a new type of Protestantism headed by the King or Queen of England.

Reformation - when countries across Europe started to take on Protestantism.

Martin Luther - a protestant reformer

Social status - the value that someone is believed to have to society.

Dissolution of the monasteries - When Henry VIII raided and broke up Catholic Churches and monasteries for their riches.

Nationality - the country you come from.

Spanish Armada - the Spanish navy.

Discovery - finding new things.
